I am young, I am twenty years old; yet I know nothing of life but despair, death, fear, and fatuous superficiality cast over an abyss of sorrow. I see how peoples are set against one another, and in silence, unknowingly, foolishly, obediently, innocently slay one another. I see that the keenest brains of the world invent weapons and words to make it yet more refined and enduring. And all men of my age, here and over there, throughout the whole world, see these things; all my generation is experiencing these things with me... Through the years our business has been killing; —it was our first calling in life. Our knowledge of life is limited to death. What will happen afterwards? And what shall come out of us?


Meanwhile, new styles of art and

architecture rejected everything that people had depended on before July 1914. They rejected the notion of reason and wholesomeness, and instead embraced irony and the general irrationality of the world. These artistic movements, often grouped together under the title of "modernism". were a reaction to the horrors of the

conflict.
